President's Message

Lately, I have been thinking about perspective and finding positives in what may seem like a negative situation.

One of the most difficult chapters in my life occurred after I graduated college in 1991. I wasn't accepted to any of the 8 laws schools I applied to and I wasn't ready to start my career. So, I went to Israel with a college roommate. Our plan was to complete a 5-month Ulpan course and then do 3 months of basic training in the Israeli Army.

In less than 2 weeks, we had started our Ulpan at Kibbutz Hatzor, East of Ashdod. The Ulpan rooms were right next to the turkey houses and underneath the final approach to an Air Force Base. In addition, many of the students were from Russia and other Eastern bloc countries. We had nothing in common and couldn't even communicate with them. My initial job was to clean the floor of the dining hall (Chadar Ochel) with a mini Zamboni. I was incredulous and couldn't believe the situation I was in.

My college roommate left after one night. He couldn't stand the smell or the noise. My second roommate was a former Marine and he lasted less than a week.

My third roommate was Josh Cohen, and we became great friends. He and I shared the same 8-month plan, but he also wanted to make Aliyah and complete military service of 3 years. Unlike me, Josh had no family. Estranged from his mom and having never known his dad, Josh had to grow up faster than I did. Josh was even agreeable to waking-up at 2am to help load turkeys into trucks or fix drip irrigation lines in the fields.

It took weeks for me to realize that my situation was a lot better than I originally perceived. Kibbutz Hatzor was teaching me Hebrew and providing room and board. I was learning about the Kibbutz families and the volunteers from the Scandinavian countries and was becoming great friends with the other Ulpan students. I even began to appreciate the "bloc" kids as our Hebrew improved and I more clearly understood their plight.

The balance of my Ulpan experience flew by. I even volunteered to load turkeys, pick vegetables in the field, and became life-long friends with Josh, and two other buddies, Seth from Staten Island and Sacha from Berlin. We've run marathons together, celebrated our children's Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, and stay in touch via WhatsApp and Facebook.

If I had quit the Ulpan, I would have missed out on this life-changing experience. I am thankful that I was able to change my perspective and find the positives in what initially seemed like a negative situation. —Mitch Cohen, TBS, President



Alison shared the work of the company and clarified the difference between temporary sheltered housing and permanent supportive housing. Permanent supportive housing supports homeless and low-income individuals and families as they strive to lift themselves from the cycle of poverty. It helps them have a place called "home" rather than accommodations at a shelter. Community Development Partners advocates for increased funding to support a multi-year commitment from state and county to offer low and reduced cost housing options to those in need.
