From the Rabbi's Study

When You Don't Have Time for Prayer...

Very few people know that before she died, Evelyn Wood was hard at work on a revolutionary new speed-reading program: "Davening Dynamics" -- for all of us left in the dust (or the pews) by the explosive speed of our liturgy. The truth is, we pray too fast. This is no surprise; in our culture, we do everything too fast -- We drive too fast, eat too fast, talk too fast. But of all things, to pray too fast! The Congregation stares at their watches, rolling their eyes, hoping they get home...for what? Is there something so compelling on TV, that we can't spare ten minutes for silent meditation? Is there a social engagement, a tennis game, a repair man waiting at the door that we couldn't take fifteen more minutes to address what's most important in life? (cont. on page 2)

From the Rabbi's Study, Cont.

The tradition teaches that one should pray every day. Begin the day with a few moments of meditation and reflection. Reflect on the passions that brought us to this point in life. Reconnect with our deepest values. Evaluate where we are in life, and where we're going. Listen to the voice of the soul.

The Hasidim have a tradition that each word of the Amida prayer is uniquely precious and deserving of its own Kavanah -- its own intense concentration. You say each word and stay there, until you've fully internalized that word. You must fully realize the power and depth of each word. There's no hurry to get on to the next. At least, pray each word for one minute. It will take you about three hours to finish the whole prayer. But you'll be transformed.

Baruch ... what does it mean to say "Blessed" to the universe? In what ways am I blessed? How many blessings do I overlook each day? Whom do I bless? What does it mean to hold the power of blessing?

Atah ... what kind of chutzpah does it take to say YOU to the Creator?! The tradition could have taught, Baruch et Adonai -- Blessed is God. In Hebrew, the article *et*, which introduces the grammatical object, and the pronoun *atah* are almost identical. Only the letter *hey* separates them in spelling. But an entire universe separates them in attitude. *Et* is cold, detached, and impersonal. *Atah* means intimacy, familiarity, caring.

Adonai ... the Name. It is an unpronounceable permutation of the verb "to be". All that was. All that is. All that ever will be. Including me. It is eternity. It is the eternity that willed me into existence. For what purpose am I here? For what mission am I present?

This month, take three minutes for these three words. *Baruch Atah Adonai*. That's all, just three minutes first thing in the morning. Not for God. For you. Not to change God's mind. To change your mind. To lift you up. To bring you closer. To fill you with strength. Three words. Three minutes. And it will change the rest of your life.

President's Message

This month I am writing my article just days after the hostage situation at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas. Candidly I am at a loss for words, which for those that know me sounds impossible. I am saddened by the event, yet relieved by the resolution. I am scared for our greater Jewish community, yet inspired that we continually overcome hatred.

As I pour over how this affects TBS and what we can do to protect our community, I find myself a little disoriented. Since I have joined the leadership team at TBS, our primary safety and security issue has been COVID. We have been planning and replanning our mitigation efforts around this ever-changing situation with new and updated information evolving almost daily. Our worries have been about making hand sanitizer and masks available, being able to pivot to virtual options if necessary, and upgrading our ventilation indoors. Yet, in one 11-hour period, we are reminded about the reality and gravity of being a Jewish institution and what we must do to stay safe.

It's not easy being Jewish, especially in Orange County. I had this conversation with my parents recently, who are native New Yorkers. They didn't have to miss a day of school for the High Holy Days or explain to other classmates what a challah was, and they didn't have to "find" Jewish friends. Growing up in California, I had to work hard at these things, especially to have Jewish friends and a Jewish community. (cont. on page 3)

Being Jewish takes work and so does fostering our connections. I consciously and actively participate to make sure this community remains here for me, my family, and all of you. This is what we have always done as a people: work hard to be Jewish.

I am thankful for the bravery and safety of the four Colleyville hostages. I pray for a speedy recovery of their mental health and for the healing of CBI as a community. And I pray for the continued safety of ours. L'Shalom.

Sisterhood



TBS Sisterhood is working to meet a need in our community, and we are asking you to join us in this effort. Every day in the U.S, countless women and girls must choose between food and tampons. Some low-income and homeless women resort to selling their food stamps to pay for feminine hygiene products. Food stamps, SNAP, and most other government programs don't cover these products. Many shelters don't have them in their budgets, and some are hesitant to ask for donations of these products because of embarrassment.

How can we help? March is National Women's Month, so it is a perfect time to show our support for the unhoused girls and women in our community. During February and March, we will collect feminine hygiene products such as tampons, pads, and packs of personal wipes that we'll assemble into individual kits at our Sisterhood meeting on March 23rd. It will be a fun activity, a chance to catch-up and chat with our sisters while doing something good for our community. There is a marked box in the temple living room for donated products. After assembled, the kits will be donated to the Southwest Community Center in Santa Ana.

Settled Rabbi Search Committee

The Settled Rabbi Search Committee was kept very busy conducting more first and second round interviews during the month of January. We continue to be impressed with the caliber of candidates applying to Temple Beth Sholom. As of this writing, the committee has vetted fourteen (14) applicants, engaged nine (9) of them in first-round interviews, and conducted second-round interviews with five (5). By the beginning of February, we expect to bring a select number of finalists to the TBS campus for onsite interviews—assuming COVID doesn’t prevent this from happening.

It’s worth noting that the rabbinic search timeline has been noticeably compressed this year and the overall recruiting process accelerated compared with previous years. This is largely due to the impact of COVID. As such, the committee has had to adapt our approach to make sure we remain competitive to TBS in the best possible position to attract the right candidate.

Searching the Prophets for Values

From the essence of Torah, the prophets sought to elevate the Divine covenant beyond the virtual praxis of the Priestly class. The Prophets were those who sought to speak truth to power and to help the Jewish community elevate their lives in connection to the Holy and Blessed One. From Joshua to Ezekiel, each Prophet carved out their message of hope for the future.

Focus on Jewish Disability Awareness Month

The goal of Jewish Disability Awareness Month is to understand that having a disability is "part of the human condition," but more importantly that we "see humanity in each person we meet." In the U.S., 54 million citizens have some form of disability (National Organization of Disability). One in 12 children has a disability (2010 Census), which means 5.2 children have one or more of the 13 conditions identified under the Federal Educational categories. The current census will likely report a higher number.

Individuals with disabilities lag behind the national average in education completed, employment rates, income, technology access, home ownership, voter participation and many other life activities. Jewish tradition teaches us about our obligation to ensure equal access for all people and to help facilitate the full participation of individuals with disabilities in religious and public life. As Jews we have a religious obligation to actively include people with disabilities in our community and advocate for their full inclusion in all facets of public life.

As we enter the month of February, let us remind ourselves of ways to be an individual ally to people with disabilities.

- Listen To People Who Have Disabilities: "Do not look at the container, but what is in it." (Pirke Avot 4:27)
- Educate Yourself: Take the time to learn about the state of disability rights in the U.S., best practices, and disability inclusion efforts.
- Be Conscious of The Language You Use: Use person-first language.
- Work For Inclusion in Your Own Community: "Behold how good and pleasant it is when all people live together as one." (Psalm 133)
- Advocate for Disability Rights: "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves."

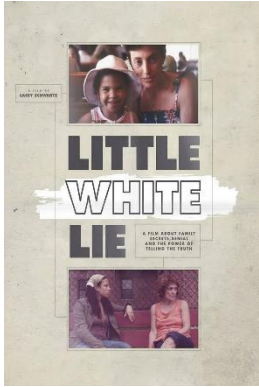
