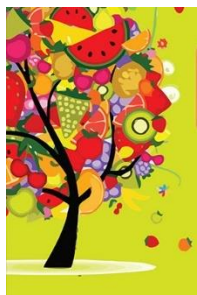

Totally Tu B’Shvat

On February 3-5, we are thrilled to welcome our artist/scholar-in-residence, Daniel Abramson, for our “Totally Tu B’Shvat” intergenerational weekend. Many of you have already submitted your tallit stories and photos for our tallit project launched in anticipation of this weekend. We'll be publishing and distributing them on Friday, February 3rd. How are the themes of “tallit” and Tu B’Shvat intertwined?

As we celebrate Tu B’Shvat, the “New Year of the Trees,” we are reminded of the beauty and importance of nature in our lives. This holiday is a perfect opportunity to reflect on the ways in which we can connect with the natural world and appreciate its gifts. We do this by eating fruits that are grown in the land of Israel, specifically seven species that are mentioned in the Torah (wheat, barley, dates, olives, figs, grapes, and pomegranates). We celebrate nature and pay attention to how we can conserve, protect, and care for the earth. (cont. on page 2)

Over the course of the entire February 3rd - 5th weekend we will use the medium of study, symbolism, art, food, drink along with a plethora of activities at our festival on Sunday to allow us to express our connection to nature in a unique and personal way. As we create, we are reminded of the beauty and majesty of the world around us.

The large TBS communal tallit we'll create this weekend with Daniel will be one more way to connect with nature on Tu B'shvat. The tallit is traditionally made from wool or linen, or silk: materials sourced from the natural world. Wearing a tallit is a reminder of our connection to the earth and its bounty.

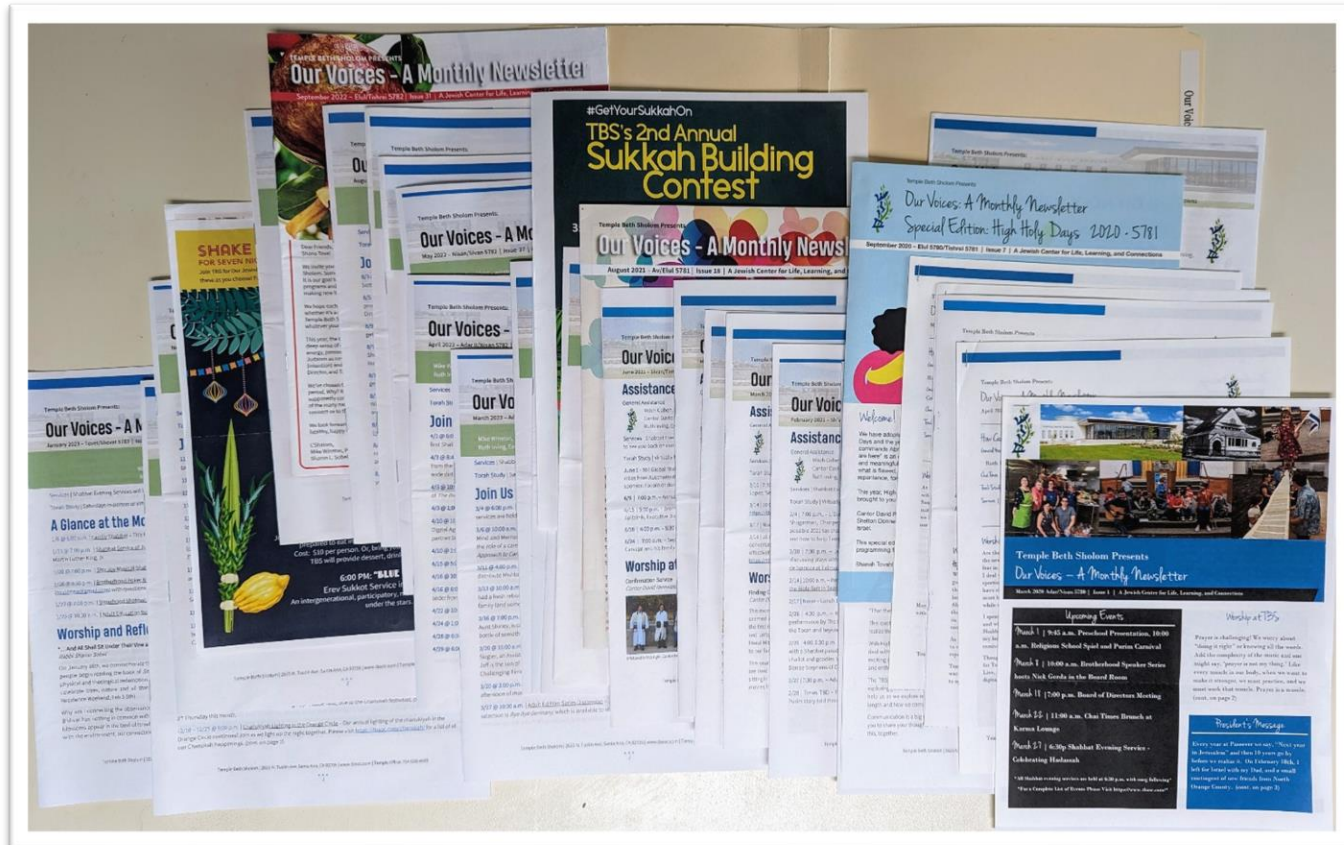
